


PUTTING A FALCON ON THE ICE

Egidio is a proud U.S. Army veteran who served in the 101st Airborne Division in Vietnam. Egidio is a devoted husband to his wife Camille, father to his children Sly Jr. and Kristine, and proud grandfather to Vincenzo, Owen, Aubrey, and Evan.

During his years at Fisher, Egidio's trademark has been his caring, no-nonsense approach to police work. Egidio's motto is that "Fisher is family" and he treated each student like one of his own children. Egidio worked the overnight shift, with the occasional double shift taking him into the school day. A STAR IS BORN

THE FISHER COLLEGE WOMEN'S BASKETBALL TEAM finished their best season in program history (17-12) with an invitation to the NAIA A.I.I.'s post-season tournament in Gary, Indiana.

While two senior twins, Madison and Murphy Carroll, made a major impact throughout the season, the Falcons were also led by freshman Choon-Hee Chae '21 (Management). Chae came to Fisher from just outside Austin, TX and immediately proved to be an asset. As a 5'6" shooting guard, Chae started in all 29 games of the season, averaging more than 36 minutes of play per game and leading the team in 3-pt accuracy (41%) and free throw percentage (77%) with an average of 15.9 points per game.

Her accomplishments as a freshman are rare for a student athlete of any age, and the coaching staff is excited for the coming seasons with Chae on the roster.

"If given the chance," says Gali, "I would do this again in a heartbeat."




FALCON NAMED **ARTHUR J. ASHE** AWARD RECIPIENT



FOR THE NINTH CONSECUTIVE YEAR, FISHER College offered an alternative spring break program with Habitat for Humanity, and thirteen students traveled to Waynesburg, PA in order to provide housing for displaced and disadvantaged families. During the trip, students volunteered to build houses, shingle roofs, wire homes, and landscape—among many other things. Past alternative spring break locations have included Tampa, FL, Macon, GA, El Paso, TX, New Bern, NC, Los Angeles, CA, Biloxi, MI, Palm Bay, FL, and Cleveland, OH.

Soon after they arrived back in Boston, alternative spring break participants had the chance to reflect on their experiences. Multiple students, including Tori Jacobs '19 (Psychology) and Madison Duffy '21 (Management), were impressed by the positive impact that Camp Director Moriah Merrill had on the group. "Merrill is one of the most influential people that I have ever met," said Jacobs. "He exudes a strong sense of joy, and he has an optimistic personality." Similarly, Duffey described Merrill as "such a genuine human being who simply wants to help others and spread positivity."

Senior and veteran participant Jill Hennessey '18 (Human Services) has had so many formative experiences on the alternative spring breaks that she decided to switch her major to Human Services. "Making the decision to go to Mississippi my freshman year and to continue to travel has shaped my education," said Hennessey. "I chose to study Human Services and Diversity because I was moved by the work we did and the people we helped there. After this year, I have made the decision to join AmeriCorps (hopefully with Habitat for Humanity) and extend this one week of service into a yearlong journey."

Fisher College Librarian and alternative spring break advisor, Josh McKain, reflected, "In Waynesburg, we stayed in a large, religiously affiliated facility that had separate bunk rooms for the men and the women, an expansive dining hall with a professional kitchen, an indoor basketball court, a game room with a pool table, a foosball table, myriad board games, and an electric fireplace. "We had a bonfire one night and made s'mores as the snow fell. We piled into two vans and traveled as a group—an important tradition that I firmly believe builds community and lasting friendships."

A sense of camaraderie is a defining element of Fisher's alternative spring break experience. "Each trip is eventful, each location is unique, each project is rewarding, and each group is different," said McKain. "What is important is to remind ourselves that we are all in this together for the benefit of a family who will be moving into their first home, and it is imperative that we be respectful to one another, support one another, and be flexible as we navigate these uncharted territories as a group."

Fisher College is proud of our students who, instead of spending their spring break in a tropical paradise, choose to make the world a better place by exhibiting leadership skills and performing community service in order to help others.

The Magic of Boots

One student's journey to inspire her daughter—and the world

KAREN GASPERINI '19 (MEDIAL CODING) DOESN'T take walking across the floor for granted. This is because Gasperini, a Fisher College student studying Billing and Coding, has battled Beals Syndromealso known as clubbed feet—all her life.

Although Gasperini's three brothers were around to support her, as a kid she was still bullied, making her syndrome hard to cope with through childhood.

Years later her daughter, Arianna, was diagnosed with the same condition. Living with Beals is not easy, and at only five, Arianna began to push back when it came to the sometimes grueling physical therapy sessions. At this moment, Gasperini knew she needed to do something, and that's when she took pen to paper and wrote Arianna's Magic Boots.

Gasperini explained her motivation for writing the story: "My daughter, Arianna, inspired me to write this series. She is who my character is based on and named after. My daughter had a hard time going to physical therapy and wearing her leg braces so I would tell her, 'Lets pretend your leg braces are magic boots and they can take you on adventures.' She loved it." These stories are meant to help her daughter stay strong and cope with the syndrome.

Gasperini would tell her daughter and nephew these stories from time-to-time. Then a friend convinced her to make her tales into a series.

"My children's book series is about a five-year-old disabled girl [named Arianna]."

"Like my daughter, she uses her leg braces, the magic boots called Ankle-Foot Orthosis (AFOs), along with her imagination to take her on adventures such as going to physical therapy, a trip to the beach, or even a trip to the doctor's office."

Gasperini's first book was published in October, 2017 while her second book, Underwater Sea Adventure, was published in March, 2018.

"I added my three nieces in the (second) book as the mermaids Arianna meets. I made sure the mermaids are true to my nieces, wearing their favorite colors and other special details. I had the illustrator draw them from a photo and make my niece, Destiny, who wears hearing aids, portray a character in the story also with hearing aids. To make her feel confident, my littlest niece's character, Carmela, is wearing her glasses, which she has had a hard time wearing."

And how has this experience affected Gasperini? "It has made me feel like I'm on cloud nine. It has been so surreal, kind of like a dream. It's almost what you feel like when you're a child at Christmas, waking up that morning feeling enthusiastic, overexcited, giddy, and everything else in between. I can't believe I published two books within only five months. I remember the day the proof came for my first book. I couldn't even sleep that night I was so excited!"

"My stories are made so that children who wear AFOs can have a story they can see and read about a hard time they may have gone through." Gasperini's daughter is also very thrilled with her mother's accomplishments. Arianna strongly believes that her mother's stories will help children who are having a hard time wearing their AFOs and might need a little magic in their lives.

Gasperini has words of encouragement for writers too: "I would like to tell prospective writers that if you want to write then write. Don't give up on your dream if publishing companies or agents deny you. Keep pushing until you get a 'yes' because you can get a million 'nos', but all you need is one 'yes' to be published. Or you can do what I did, which is to make your own path and publish your work on your own. I watched tons of how-to-publish-your-own-book videos on YouTube. Also, CreateSpace, an Amazon-based publishing company, offers step-by-step instructions for beginners. Those instructions helped a lot.

In making her book available to the public, Gasperini hopes that she can make a positive impact on children in general.

"My personal message to children would be what I tell my daughter everyday: be who you choose to be. Don't change or try to fit into what someone else considers normal. If they don't want to be your friend, that's their loss. Never make someone feel unwanted for being different."

Her book also contains a message for her daughter: "I also tell my daughter to show the world how amazing she is so the world can see what I see. And for her to know that she does not have to try and be like everyone else, but just be herself. People like her and I who are born with a disability were born to stand out and that is a very powerful thing."

The Gasperinis have a tradition of passing knowledge from one generation to the next: "My Grandfather would tell me, 'Look at that. You were born a superstar at birth which is why people stare at you. Keep your head held high and make sure you always look someone in the eye and say, 'hello' with a smile.' He would tell me to be proud of who I am."

Gasperini continues to tell her daughter the same.

Listening to a New Generation

Reflections on the academic year with Fisher President Alan Ray.

THE END OF SPRING SEMESTER IS AN EXCITING TIME FOR many. As the stress of the academic year diminishes, summer vacation promises quieter times. For Alan Ray, this is the culmination of his first year as Fisher College's ninth president, and he looks forward to a promising future for the College under his leadership.

Having a multi-faceted background as a lawyer, academic, senior administrator at Harvard Law School, and member of the Obama-era National Advisory Council on Indian Education, Dr. Ray is well-versed in what it means to problem-solve in order to propel institutions forward. His early career was spent in law, but he always held academia very close to his heart.

Realizing that he missed being around academic ideas and the people who love to share them, Dr. Ray made the move into higher education administration at Harvard as the Law School's Associate

Dean for Academic Affairs. In this role, Dr. Ray helped plan the curriculum, create new courses, and work with students to create a learning environment that they truly wanted. He also appeared in the classroom as a Lecturer on Law.

From there he went on to work at the top academic levels of the University of New Hampshire before he was appointed President of Elmhurst College, just outside of Chicago, in 2008. As Elmhurst's president, he felt that all of his prior professional experiences came together as he put his focus on student success. Elmhurst, a small college not unlike Fisher, showed Dr. Ray the ways in which a close-knit environment can be "a laboratory for student success." He explains, "Campus culture is built around a coherent philosophy of student self-formation, strong academics, and community service."



Having found deep satisfaction providing leadership in a small environment, Dr. Ray's interest was immediately piqued when the Fisher College presidency opened. He was attracted to Fisher because, like Elmhurst, the school has a commitment to providing access to higher education for qualified students who come from diverse backgrounds. Fisher's "many first generation students and its inclusive spirit of community" drew him in.

As the summer begins, Dr. Ray can already look back on major accomplishments at Fisher, including the completion and launch of a new five-year Strategic Plan for the College titled "Moving Fisher Forward." The Strategic Plan calls for finding new, attractive spaces for Falcon athletics, a renewed rapport with the College's Back Bay neighbors, and the establishment of an Office of Advancement and Alumni Engagement.

Over the course of his career, Dr. Ray has implemented over a dozen institution-wide strategic plans for improving technology, diversity, emergency procedures, and academic programs to name a few. He now regards the Fisher College Strategic Plan as his most far reaching first-year accomplishment. "The Strategic Plan was built from the ground up utilizing the insights of all campus constituencies," he says.

THE NEW STRATEGIC PLAN'S SEVEN GOALS

- Increase program enrollment across the College
- Add new and exciting academic programs positioning Fisher graduates for continued success
- Expand Full-time Faculty
- Grow Fisher's inclusive and diverse community of faculty, staff, and students
- Upgrade College building infrastructure
- Increase philanthropic giving and alumni engagement
- Significantly raise the College's profile and reputation within higher education, the Boston market, and beyond

It is important to Dr. Ray that Fisher make a splash with new and innovative academic programs. Boston is one of the most competitive cities for higher education, with many highly sought after institutions. Bachelor's and master's degree programs in fields such as sport management, human resource management, entrepreneurship, criminal justice, psychology, and information technology (including specializations in cyber security and game technology) will make Fisher more competitive and more appealing to incoming students at all levels, and will keep Fisher at the forefront of current local and national trends.

"With these programs and many others in place," says Dr. Ray, "Fisher will be able to quickly capitalize on a more exciting and competitive academic portfolio not only to attract more well-qualified students, but also to retain and graduate more of the students we already have."

Dr. Ray's goal, as for any college president, is to keep students attending until they complete their degree. His hope and expectation is that the creation of more career-relevant opportunities for Fisher students will result in increased student satisfaction, campus pride, and alumni loyalty and engagement.

The world is a far different place than it was before the 2008 recession. Businesses and schools including colleges, which are both, must adapt to shifting economic and demographic trends.

As the job market evolves through increasingly accelerated implementation of technology in all fields, students and professionals must remain competitive in order to keep up. With such great pressure on everyone involved in education and business, Dr. Ray stays focused on ensuring that the students at Fisher College will not only be molded into great professionals, but also be transformed into the best people they can be.

"We are determined to provide the finest education and opportunities for personal growth possible in order to prepare our students for the ever-changing demands of our world," says Dr. Ray. "As their journeys continue, Fisher will always be there, helping them become the leaders of tomorrow. Their future is our future."

On Saturday May 12, 2018, Fisher College celebrated its 114th Commencement Ceremony at the John Hancock Back Bay Event Center. A total of 234 eager students crossed the stage to receive their diploma and start the next chapter of their lives. This is one of the largest graduating classes that the College has seen since its founding in 1903. Among this year's graduates were nine veterans, 24 MBA students, 31 athletes, and 32 graduating students in the Honors Program. 

Mr. McDonnell is no stranger to nonprofit leadership roles, having served as a member of the Board of Trustees at his alma mater, Suffolk University.

The new configuration of the Board is both multifaceted and cohesive. DR. NICHOLAS BANKSON has served for 25 years on Fisher's Board of Trustees, including four years as Board chair. He has an AA degree from Graceland College in Iowa, a BS degree from the University of Kansas, and MA and PhD degrees from the University of Kansas Medical Center. His professional area of expertise is speech-language pathology, and he served as the director of speech and hearing services for the Kansas Department of Public Instruction. Additionally, Dr. Bankson has received honors from the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association as well as honors from the Council of Academic Programs in Communication Sciences and Disorders, and honors from the National Student Speech and Hearing Association. He is the co-author of a college textbook focused on speech sound disorders.



JOHN MCDONNELL is the newest member of Fisher's Board, having joined in the fall of 2017. McDonnell is the current Managing Director International at Tito's Vodka and the former COO of Patron Tequila. In that role, McDonnell advanced Patron's global distribution from 340,000 cases per year to 2 million. Additionally, he is credited with creating a new category in the tequila market—the ultra-premium bottle priced at \$40 or more. McDonnell has spoken at Fisher twice, and in April 2017, he made a generous donation that enabled Fisher's School of Graduate Studies to build the McDonnell Family MBA and Entrepreneurship Center. McDonnell's daughter, Erin, graduated from Fisher in 2015 with a degree in Human Services.

ELIZABETH GAVETT is a licensed Speech-Language Pathologist with more than five publications, and she has presented her findings and research on development and critical thinking strategies for phonological/articulation disorders throughout the country. Powers Award for Teaching Excellence from the Boston University College of Health and Rehabilitation Sciences: Sargent College and was named Fellow of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association.

Some of Rogers' most notable accomplishments include multi-facility manufacturing and distribution increases from \$4 million to \$26 million in annual revenue through his strategic acquisition and integration of numerous organizations. 
